DOMESTIC & FAMILY VIOLENCE PREVENTION

For the four Sundays of Advent, we have quoted in the parish newsletter and homily, extracts from the Queensland Churches Together resource on Domestic Family Violence Prevention. Extracts from Week 4 are below.

"... As family members, neighbours and friends, today's scripture is a reminder to be alert, to be informed and aware, and to be prepared to offer support and understanding. Statistically across Australia, one person is killed at the hands of an intimate partner – estranged or otherwise – every week. These are the cases that come across our News feeds, airwaves and television screens, but for many more, the suffering happens behind closed doors and in the dark, and while not resulting in death, can still be devastating. The harm to children is

incalculable and long term, and the cost to the community is astronomical. Members of the Joint Churches Commission for Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence have initiated this campaign to raise awareness of this largely hidden blight on our families, neighbourhoods and communities. Eliminating domestic violence starts with recognising that it occurs everywhere, even within our own church, and recognising that this season is a particularly dangerous time for such families. We want to make our churches safe places, refuges from domestic and family violence... "

Let us pray "For communities to offer safe places for people dealing with abusive relationships... Gracious God hear us."

MESSAGE FROM ARCHBISHOP MARK COLERIDGE

"Not only the Western Downs and Queensland but people from all across Australia have been shocked to the core by the killings at Wieambilla. It's impossible to make sense of it, so mad and demonic the whole thing seems. But one thing we can do is surround the members of the QPS, their families and friends and the communities affected, with every kind of support, including prayer for those killed, for their families and the devastated communities — especially at this Christmas time. We think in a special way and with a special sorrow of Rachel and Matthew cut down in their youth. But we think too of the Police Commissioner and all those called to lead the QPS through this traumatic time. Not everyone prays or believes that prayer has both purpose and power. But we Christians believe both. That's why in a moment like this we have the duty, even the social duty, to pray not only for the dead but also for the living so deeply wounded by this atrocity...peace for the dead and consolation for the living."

GOSPEL OF MATTHEW 1:18-24

Joseph knows he is not the father, but his concern is for Mary. The Gospel continues,

"Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly".

Now God acts again, this time through an angel of the Lord appearing in a dream to Joseph and saying,

"Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit."

We see Jesus instructing the early community later in Matthew Chapter 18. He spoke about the shepherd who leaves the 99 sheep to go searching for the one missing. The shepherd moved out of his comfort zone.

And we know this applies to every Christian community. We pray for the courage to move out of our comfort zone.

Let us now pause and identify God's gifts to us.
