1) TEN-YEARLY REVIEW OF THE ENVIRONMENT IN AUSTRALIA

The Environment in Australia is impacted by all levels In Government.

Concerning Commonwealth legislation, the <u>Second Independent Review of the Environment</u> <u>Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999</u> is now under way.

The current review comes ten years after the last review.

In its *Discussion Paper* it says,

'The EPBC Act is more than 1000 pages of complex legislation, to which has been added over 400 pages of regulations. This review is a once in a decade opportunity to look closely at the Act, how it operates, and what it is achieving. While it is not a review of environment policy — which is the job of government — this review is a crucial opportunity to make recommendations to ensure that the Act is fit for the future. Changing land use, invasive pests and weeds, a changing climate, more frequent extreme weather events, and fires continue to put pressure on our environment and heritage. Australia's population, the ways that businesses operate, and how governments regulate are changing. Community and business expectations of governments are vastly different from when the EPBC Act was first legislated 20 years ago.'

MAGI - THE WISE ONES FROM THE EAST

This Sunday we hear from Matthew's Gospel 2:1-12 about the Magi from the East. Sometimes in the Christmas Crib, they are shown as Kings.

But the Gospel calls them Magi.

The Magi were known as wise people from Eastern traditions.

They came **searching for the truth**, following a star.

As we focus nationally on the environment, let us search for the truth together. Like the Magi, may we journey in truth.

THE MAGI CAME TO WORSHIP JESUS

The Magi knew that the child they sought was the king of the Jews.

They came not only to meet and greet, or to pay their respects.

They came to give homage to the child.

The Greek word is for worship in English. They worshipped Jesus.

Jewish priests and scribes quoted a prophecy to Herod, pointing to Bethlehem as the place.

"And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Not only a ruler, but also one who shepherds his people.

We pause and ask a question.

In what ways do I expect Jesus to shepherd me this year?

HEROD

As we note in the world media, we face heightened tensions in parts of our world, particularly in the Middle East these past few days.

Though we might think of the Christmas scene as one of peace, Matthew's Gospel points out the **dangers faced by Jesus** from the very beginning. Particularly the wrath, jealousy and cruelty of Herod who sought to kill Jesus. The Gospel tells us that Herod was "frightened".

Herod tried to manipulate the Magi so that he could find out where Jesus was.

Just as the **Magi represent** our searching for the truth, so **Herod represents** the temptations and dangers of envy, violence, cruelty, manipulation, and misuse of power and wealth.

The Gospel continues:

"Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

SOLIDARITY & PRAYER IN 2020

The Magi story informs us:

"When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage.

Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh."

We think of the Australians who have opened their homes to people seeking refuge from the bushfires.

We think of their gifts of hospitality and compassion and hope.

During the week ahead, the Church in Australia is to announce further support for those affected by the bushfires.

Already there are <u>St Vincent de Paul Bushfire Appeals online</u> where people can contribute.

As the Magi brought gifts to Jesus, may we bring as gifts,

- our offering of hospitality and compassion,
- our love and faith,
- our hope and joy,
- our commitment as disciples and witnesses and neighbours, and in particular in 2020, among many issues to be faced,
- our solidarity with, and prayer and love for, others in distress.

Let us pray.
