ANZAC DAY

Before reflecting on today's Gospel Reading, we place our prayers before God this ANZAC DAY. Let us pray together the Opening Prayer of the ANZAC Day Mass.

Almighty everlasting God, who sent your Son to die that we might live, grant, we pray, eternal rest to those who gave themselves in service and sacrifice for their country. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

There are many dimensions to ANZAC Day.

We pray five petitions, the first three being from the official Anzac Day Mass.

1. We pray:

"For leaders of nations, that those in positions of authority may work with honesty and integrity towards achieving harmony amongst peoples, and providing security for the vulnerable. Let us pray to the Lord. Lord, hear our prayer."

2. We pray:

"For all who are remembering our ANZACs on this day, that our annual remembrance may give witness to the freedom they fought for, and our prayers provide comfort and consolation to those left with the wounds and pains of war. Let us pray to the Lord. Lord, hear our prayer."

- 3. Some members of our parish community have been refugees from war. We pray: "For all people who have been driven from their homelands because of war and terror, that they may find safety and lasting refuge. Let us pray to the Lord. Lord, hear our prayer."
- 4. We pray for those who are serving in Australia and overseas. We pray for their safety and for the people they protect. Let us pray to the Lord. Lord, hear our prayer.
- 5. We pray today for the gifts of healing and peace in our world. Let us pray to the Lord. Lord, hear our prayer.
