# ALERT AND AWAKE TO OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Today's Gospel passage from Mark 13:33-37 to "KEEP ALERT", to "KEEP AWAKE" uses the image of a person going on a **journey**, leaving everyone with their **responsibilities** to fulfil. No one knows when the Master will return.

# AS A LOCAL PARISH COMMUNITY, WHAT ARE OUR RESPONSIBILITIES THAT GOD HAS ENTRUSTED TO US?

One of our responsibilities is expressed in the parable in Luke's Gospel of the Good Samaritan, to care for our neighbour.

WHO IS OUR NEIGHBOUR? HOW DO WE ENCOUNTER OUR NEIGHBOUR?

Another responsibility is to be **people of mercy**.

In mercy when we reach out to our neighbour, we reach out to God, as seen by the **Last Judgement** story in Matthew's Gospel last week. This includes the hungry, thirsty, stranger, naked, sick, imprisoned. WHO ELSE DOES IT INCLUDE?

# POPE FRANCIS - CUTURE OF ENCOUNTER, DIALOGUE AND COOPERATION

Pope Francis has written on a culture of encounter.

One of his most recent writings is Friday's Address in Bangladesh to an Ecumenical and Interreligious Meeting for Peace.

He spoke of shaping a culture of encounter, dialogue and cooperation in the service of our human family.

Part of Francis address says:

"This entails more than mere tolerance.

It challenges us to reach out to others in mutual trust and understanding, and so to build a unity that sees diversity not as a threat, but as a potential source of enrichment and growth. It challenges us to cultivate an openness of heart that views others as an avenue, not a barrier."

Pope Francis spoke of essential features of this "openness of heart" – a DOOR, a LADDER, a PATH and that this heart is a STRONGLY BEATING HEART.

The four quotes below are from the address of Pope Francis.

## 1. DOOR

"First, it is a door. It is not an abstract theory but a lived experience. It enables us to embark on a dialogue of life, not a mere exchange of ideas. It calls for good will and acceptance, yet it is not to be confused with indifference or reticence in expressing our most deeply held convictions.

To engage fruitfully with another means sharing our distinct religious and cultural identity, but always with humility, honesty and respect."

#### 2. LADDER

"Openness of heart is also like a ladder that reaches up to the Absolute. By recalling this transcendent dimension of our activity, we realize the need for our hearts to be purified, so that we can see all things in their truest perspective.

As with each step our vision becomes clearer, we receive the strength to persevere in the effort to understand and value others and their point of view. In this way, we will find the wisdom and strength needed to extend the hand of friendship to all."

# 3. PATH

"Openness of heart is likewise a path
that leads to the pursuit of goodness, justice and solidarity.
It leads to seeking the good of our neighbours.
In his letter to the Christians in Rome, Saint Paul urged his hearers:
"Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good" (Rom 12:21).
This is a sentiment that all of us can echo.
Religious concern for the welfare of our neighbour,
streaming from an open heart, flows outward like a vast river,
to quench the dry and parched wastelands
of hatred, corruption, poverty and violence
that so damage human lives, tear families apart,
and disfigure the gift of creation.

# 4. A STRONGLY BEATING HEART

"A spirit of openness, acceptance and cooperation between believers does not simply contribute to a culture of harmony and peace; it is its beating heart.

How much our world needs this heart to beat strongly, to counter the virus of political corruption, destructive religious ideologies, and the temptation to turn a blind eye to the needs of the poor, refugees, persecuted minorities, and those who are most vulnerable.

How much, too, is such openness needed

in order to reach out to the many people in our world, especially the young, who at times feel alone and bewildered as they search for meaning in life!"

Inspired by these words of Pope Francis,

and with a strong beating heart, let us be alert to God's invitation to love.

Throughout the year ahead, we know that God will surprise us.

This weekend we launch our 'PARISH YEAR OF ENCOUNTERING JESUS IN OUR NEIGHBOUR'.
